

# CEDARVILLE UNIVERSITY VEHICLE REGULATIONS

## **I Title**

The title of this document is ***The Cedarville University Vehicle Regulations (herein referred to as the CUVR).***

## **II Scope**

The Cedarville University Department of Campus Security is the authorized administrator of the vehicle regulations established herein. These guidelines have been established for both those individuals utilizing the traffic and parking facilities of Cedarville University campus and its properties and the Security Officers charged with enforcing these regulations.

## **III Purpose**

The purpose of the CUVR is to provide all vehicle operators on CU campus and properties with the governing rules and regulations designed to provide the utmost in safety and convenience for everyone, whether they are members of the Cedarville University community or not.

## **IV Summary**

The CUVR provide the basis for all traffic and parking on the CU campus and its properties. It does not and cannot cover every incident that may arise, rather it establishes the baseline for regulation and enforcement.

# **CEDARVILLE UNIVERSITY VEHICLE REGULATIONS (CUVR)**

## **Preface:**

Cedarville University (CU) has the right and ability to control traffic and parking on its campus and controlled properties, as granted by the Ohio Revised Code (ORC). The Cedarville University Department of Campus Security has been authorized to administer and enforce the Cedarville University Vehicle Regulations (herein referred to as CUVR), which governs all parking and traffic on the campus and controlled properties.

The CUVR applies to all vehicles operated on the campus and all properties under its control for educational, residential or support purposes.

Any use of a vehicle as stipulated by the Ohio Revised Code (ORC), motorized or not, which includes but is not limited to electric or gas-powered scooters, bicycles, rollerblades, skates or skateboards on any university property is a privilege granted by the university and is not the right of any employee, student or visitor. It is the requirement of the university that all employees, students and visitors comply with these vehicle regulations for the sake of safety and the consideration of others. Failure to comply with the CUVR may result in the limitation or revocation of this privilege at the discretion of the university.

The following parking and driving regulations have been adopted by the university to better facilitate both vehicle and pedestrian movement, maximize parking and enhance safety. All parking and driving regulations are strictly enforced.

**The Cedarville University Vehicle Regulations (CUVR) are subject to revision or change *without prior notice*.**

## **CUVR 100: DEFINITIONS**

Sections 100-136

The words and phrases contained in this section are defined by the meaning(s) listed as used in the CUVR unless the context of the word or phrase clearly denotes a different meaning.

### **100: 24/7 (At All Times)**

This refers to parking spaces or specifically designated areas that are restricted 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. This applies to all titled and faculty/staff spaces.

### **101: Appeal**

An appeal is a written plea to have an issued ticket overturned. The mere act of submitting an appeal does not guarantee that the ticket will be overturned.

### **102: Bicycle**

A bicycle is any two or three-wheeled device, whether propelled by human or electric power, upon which a person may sit/ride. This definition also applies to those vehicles as noted by the ORC that may be considered to be a bicycle and such items are considered to be vehicle and subject to the regulations of the CUVR.

### **103: Boot**

The "boot" is a wheel locking device used to immobilize a vehicle, rendering it undrivable. This may be referred to as "immobilized".

### **104: Campus**

Campus as used in the CUVR is the main portion of property owned and operated by Cedarville University.

### **105: Campus Parking Enforcement**

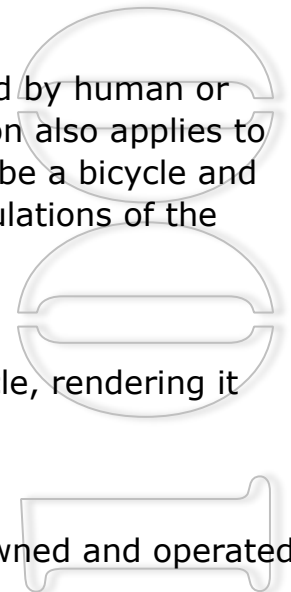
Campus Parking Enforcement refers to those rules/regulations that are specific or unique to the Cedarville campus. Some of these may have basis in ORC regulations but may not necessarily be enforced by local law enforcement.

### **106: Campus Traffic Enforcement**

Campus Traffic Enforcement refers to those rules/regulations often referred to as "moving violations" that are specific or unique to the Cedarville campus. Some of these may have a basis in ORC regulations but may not necessarily be enforced by local law enforcement.

### **107: Class (classification)**

Class or classification is the assigned within the student body as determined by the earned hours of credit, not the years of attendance or residency.



### **108: Commuter**

A commuter is any person who, while enrolled in and taking classes at Cedarville University, lives in a residence that is not owned or operated by the university and/or is not located on the university campus or property. This applies to "Dual Enrollment" students.

### **109: Department**

As used in these regulations, the Department refers to the Department of Campus Security, a division of which is parking & traffic enforcement.

### **110: Egress**

Any structural point of a building or facility designed for the entering or exiting of the building or facility.

### **111: Faculty**

A faculty member is any member who is recognized by the academic division whose primary responsibility is to teach, regardless of classification (adjunct, full-time, part-time, emeritus).

### **112: General Parking Enforcement**

General Parking Enforcement refers to the enforcement of those rules and regulations that are established and governed by the Ohio Motor Vehicle Code, including but not limited to handicap parking, fire lanes, etc.

### **113: General Traffic Enforcement**

General Traffic Enforcement refers to the enforcement of those rules and regulations as established and governed by the Ohio Motor vehicle Code, including but not limited to excessive speed, STOP signs, etc.

### **114: Graduate Student**

A graduate student is defined as any student who is engaged in classes beyond the bachelor's degree program, including those who may have received the bachelor's degree but who must still complete course work. Effective in 2024, graduate students in the Pharmacy program may live on campus as a resident (**refer to CUVR 200B**)

### **115: Habitual Offender**

A habitual offender is defined as any person who has been issued multiple ticket as defined in the CUVR (**refer to CUVR 602**).

### **116: Loading Dock**

A loading dock is a part of any building or facility specifically designated for the loading or unloading of freight by a commercial or approved delivery vehicle. A loading dock may or may not be elevated.

### **117: Loading Zone**

A loading zone is any posted area or drive designed for the temporary loading or unloading of a vehicle. Depending on the building, the loading zone may also serve as a fire lane. Loading/unloading is limited to 15 minutes for active loading or unloading.

### **118: Motor Vehicle**

In accordance with the Ohio Motor Vehicle Code, a motor vehicle is any vehicle that is self-propelled, including but not limited to motorized bicycles, motorized scooters or skateboards. They must be operated in compliance with ORC standards for operation on roadways.

### **119: Motorcycle**

A motorcycle is any self-propelled two or three-wheeled vehicle upon which a person(s) may be transported. They are to be used in compliance with ORC standards for operation on roadways.

### **120: Moving Violation**

Any infraction of regulations governing and committed while a vehicle is in motion; including but not limited to speeding, failure to stop, reckless operation, etc.

### **121: Non-Roadway**

A non-roadway is any area not designed or specified for motor vehicle use and includes but not limited to sidewalks, walking tracks, sports fields, lawns or other green areas.

### **122: Overnight**

The term overnight refers to the period of time beginning at curfew and extending until 6:00 am. Commuter lots are posted "No Overnight Parking" and vehicles parked in these lots may be ticket for "parked overnight without authorization".

### **123: Park**

The term refers to any vehicle which is stopped, regardless of location, attended or unattended .

### **124: Parking Lot**

A parking lot is any area specifically designated for the parking of motor vehicles, whether grass, gravel or blacktop, whether or not it is marked.

### **125: Parking Violation**

A parking violation is any infraction that violates the parking regulations.

### **126: Permit**

A permit is the tag or decal issued by Campus Security indicating that the vehicle has been registered with the department of Campus Security and may legally park on the campus (**refer to CUVR 200**)

### **127: Resident**

A resident is any student who, while enrolled at Cedarville and regardless of classification, lives in a resident facility owned/operated by the university or is on the campus. Apartment housing is considered residential. Married and Graduate student housing is not considered residential.

### **128: Retiree**

A retiree is any individual who has retired from service at Cedarville University. Retirees are considered to be guests of the university and are not required to register or display a permit.

### **129: Staff**

A staff member is any person employed by the university and whose primary purpose is to function in some aspect of the non-academic staff of the university. Students who work on campus are not considered to be staff members.

### **130: Student**

A student is any individual whose primary purpose is to be registered for and involved in activities that results in the receipt of credit, notation or hours earned on their academic transcript. This applies to any such person regardless of the primary location of said activities, the frequency or amount of time spent on the campus. This applies to both undergraduate and graduate students.

### **131: Ticket**

A ticket is that notice provided to a motorist when the vehicle or the motorist is in violation of the CUVR. Tickets may be issued as a warning or "fineable" and a fine will be incurred.

### **132: Time-limited**

A time-limited space is any space designated by posted signs to have a specific time limit.

### **133: Tow**

Towing is an event in which a vehicle is removed from its location and either located to another lot on campus or impounded by a third party.

**134: Traffic Control Device**

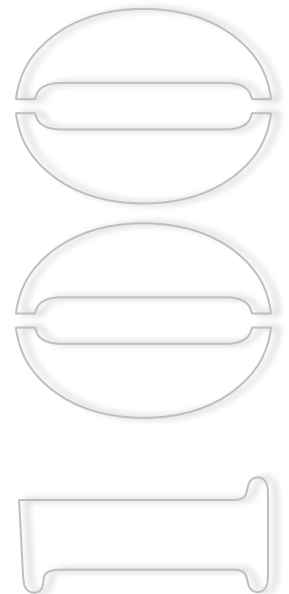
Any device including but not limited to personnel, cones, barricades, signs or pavement markings that are designed to control, direct or restrict traffic movement or parking; whether temporary or permanent.

**135: Visitor**

A visitor is any person who is not a current faculty, staff or student at Cedarville University.

**136: Warning**

A warning is defined as any time in which the officer chooses to issue a warning, whether written or verbal and does not include a fine.



## CUVR 200:STATEMENT of PERMIT & PARKNG POLICIES

Section 200-211

### 200: VEHICLE REGISTRATION & PERMITS

Every vehicle parking on or using Cedarville University facilities or property must display a current and valid permit. This applies to:

- Faculty - regardless of classification
- Staff – full & part-time as well as 3<sup>rd</sup> party contracted staff such as food service and custodial.
- Students – including resident, commuter and dual enrollment students.
  - **Students whose parents are faculty or staff and will be operating a vehicle that has a faculty/staff permit must register it as a student vehicle and operate it under the student regulations/guidelines.**
- University-owned vehicles including but not limited to maintenance vehicles and vans are exempt from permit requirements.

Cedarville University maintains sufficient parking for students, faculty and staff. Vehicle registration does not however guarantee a parking space or parking directly adjacent to any specific building or facility. Vehicle registration and the associated permit grants the owner/operator the privilege of operating and parking the vehicle on the campus or university controlled property.

**Vehicles must be registered within 24 hours or 1 business day of arriving on campus or university property.**

Merely **submitting** a permit request DOES NOT constitute registration. **Permits must be picked up at the Campus Security office and affixed properly to the lower corner of the driver's side of the front windshield.**

#### 200A: PERMIT DISTRIBUTION

Faculty and staff will receive their parking permit via mail to their department once they have completed and submitted the permit request.

Students **must** pick up their permit at the Campus Security office in the Stevens Student Center.

#### 200B: STUDENT REGISTRATION FEES

All full-time undergraduate students, whether resident or commuter, are required to pay a registration fee when they obtain their parking permit. This fee will be charged to their student account (**refer to CUVR 700 for all fees**). Fees are charged **by the year**.

## 200C: Registration Refunds

Students who complete their studies, withdraw from the university or who participate in "off-campus" experiences including but not limited to study abroad or out-of-town internships, for the second semester **must** notify and return their permit to Campus Security.

Students who registered and received the 50% discount are not eligible for a refund. Students who registered after the discount period and paid the full registration fee will be refunded 50% of that fee. This will be credited to their student account.

## 200D: STUDENT PERMITS

Students are issued permits based on their residency and classification status.

**RESIDENT** students will be issued a **BLUE** permit and are required to park in designated residential lots.

- **APARTMENT RESIDENTS** will be issued a **LIGHT BLUE** permit and are required to park at the apartments.

**COMMUTER** students will be issued a **GOLD** permit and are required to park in designated commuter lots.

**GRADUATE** students will be issued a **SILVER** permit. This permit is valid for both commuter and residential lots.

**MOTORCYCLES** will be charged the same fee as a car and will be issued a motorcycle permit based on the student's residency status. These permits are regulated the same as a standard vehicle permit. Blue permits must park in residential lots while gold permits are to park in commuter lots.

- Motorcycle permits are to be displayed on the right front fork of the motorcycle.

**NOTICE:** All parking permits are valid from August 1 of the year of issue until June 30 of the following year.

**WARNING:** There is a \$25 fee for the replacement of a lost or stolen permit.

## 200E: SPECIAL PERMITS

There are four special permits issued based on specific criteria:

- Permits with an “**F**” suffix will be issued to residents of Faith Hall. This allows these residents to park either in the back of Faith or in front of Founder’s Hall in the designated area.
- Permits with an “**H**” suffix will be issued to residents of The Hill (Rogers, Marshall, Carr & Palmer). This allows these residents to park in the Palmer lot, the Civil Engineering Center lot and the shared Chem Lab lot.
- Permits with an “**M**” suffix will be issued to residents of Maddox Hall. This allows these students to park in the Maddox/Apple parking lot.
  - Resident students who do not have one of these designates will be ticketed if found parking in one of the listed lots.
- College-View Apartments will be issued a permit with an “**A**” prefix.
- Medical permits will be issued to members of Medic-15 (CUEMS). This permit allows members to park in either residential or commuter lots. **It does not** apply to faculty/staff, visitor or titled spaces.

## 200F: TEMPORARY PERMITS

There are two types of temporary permits available:

- Temporary Parking permits. Issued for vehicles that will be on campus short term, a rental vehicle or a replacement for a registered vehicle undergoing repairs.
  - Valid for 21 days.
  - Must be visibly displayed.
- Temporary Handicap permits. Issued to those who become injured or have a medical need for temporary handicap parking.
  - Valid for 30 days.
  - Must be visibly displayed.
  - Are valid for both handicap & commuter spaces.

## 200G: REGISTRATION LIMITATIONS

### Resident students:

- May only have 1 car on campus at any given time. Students who need to “swap” vehicles may do so at no additional cost (**refer to CUVR 200H**).
- Only 1 student may register a vehicle at any given time. (Two students, such as siblings, cannot both register the same vehicle under their different ID numbers).

**Commuter students** (including students at married housing, graduate or dual-enrollment students):

- May register up to three (3) vehicles for a single charge.
-

## 200G: LIMITATIONS *continued*

- Residents of married student housing must register **all** of their vehicles, even if their spouse is not a student.

Vehicles cannot display two different permits, that is a commuter and a resident permit.

- The exception to this is a vehicle that is registered as a faculty/staff vehicle and the student is operating the vehicle. **The student MUST register the vehicle as a student vehicle and operate it in compliance with student parking regulations.**

### **200H: TRANSFER OF PERMITS**

Permits are assigned to a specific vehicle NOT to the registrant.

Students who “swap” vehicles cannot remove a permit from the initial vehicle and affix it to the second vehicle. This may be cited as fraudulent use of a permit (**refer to CUVR 307A**).

Students who “swap” or replace a registered vehicle should request a new permit for the new vehicle. Replacement permits of this type are issued at no cost.

### **200I: VEHICLES ON CAMPUS OR UNIVERSITY PROPERTY**

All vehicles parked on Cedarville University campus and/or property must display a current and valid state-issued license plate as well as a current/valid university issued parking permit (**refer to CUVR 201A**). Vehicle in violation of this are subject to citation, immobilization and/or possible towing at the owner’s expense.

### **201: LIABILITY**

Cedarville University accepts no legal responsibility nor assumes any liability for the safety/security of vehicle on its campus or properties due to theft, loss of property, vandalism, accident or other damage(s) while the vehicle is on said campus or properties.

Campus Security strongly recommends and encourages the removal of all items of value from the vehicle in order to prevent loss of property and to lock the vehicle as a deterrent to theft. It is also recommended that students check their vehicles regularly (**refer to CUVR 201B**)

## **201A: OPERATING AGREEMENT**

Any person operating and/or parking a vehicle on the university campus or controlled properties agrees to:

- Have read and to abide by the regulations herein (CUVR)
- Possess and maintain a current and valid driver's license.
- Possess and maintain current and valid registration and insurance for the registered vehicle.
- Take responsibility and pay for all fees and fines resulting from the use of their vehicle, regardless of who might be operating the vehicle at the time of the infraction.
- Protect and hold harmless the university, its students, officers and employees from all claims of injury or damages resulting from the operation of this or any other vehicle on the university campus or controlled properties.

## **201B: THE 72-HOUR RULE (Owner Responsibility)**

All owners/operators of vehicles registered on the university campus are encouraged to check their vehicle on a regular basis, for reasons of safety and security in addition to the possible need for maintenance or in regard to parking violations. Campus Security recommends and encourages checking your vehicle at least once in a 72-hour period.

## **202: OHIO REVISED CODE (ORC)**

All provisions of the Ohio Revised Code as it applies to the operation of vehicles are applicable on the Cedarville campus and its properties. This may include bicycles and skateboards as defined in ORC 4501.01. Under this provision, violations of the ORC not listed herein may be cited as "other violation" with an explanation of the infraction\*.

**\*See CUVR 400 for commonly enforced ORC codes.**

## **203: EXEMPT VEHICLES**

Campus Security, emergency services, custodial services and physical plant vehicles are exempt from time and lane or space restrictions (other than Handicap Parking), and subject to safety precautions with time limited to the performance of their duties.

In incidents of medical, fire and/or police emergencies, and no other parking is available, the use of handicap spaces is permitted while in the performance of their response to the emergency.

## **204: PARKING SPACES**

All vehicles must be parked within a painted, marked parking space unless specifically directed to do otherwise by Campus Security, local police or other

authorized person. Vehicles parked outside of a marked space or occupying multiple spaces, including the obstruction of any additional space may be cited in violation of **CUVR 306**.

## **205: MOTORCYCLE RESTRICTIONS**

- All motorcycles **must** be registered with Campus Security. The fee for motorcycles is the same as for a car (**refer to CUVR 700**).
- Motorcycles must park in accordance with the permit they bear (**refer to CUVR 200D**).
- Motorcycles may park in “hashed-off” areas in assigned parking lots at the end of any row, or in any space(s) specifically designated for motorcycle parking.
- Motorcycles may NOT park in “hashed-off” areas that are directly adjacent to or associate with a handicap parking space.
- Motorcycles may NOT park in or directly adjacent to any residence, sidewalk, building entry or stairwell.

## **206: PARKING & TRAFFIC SIGNS**

Parking and traffic signs posted on the campus are designed to communicate specific regulations. There is an implicit expectation that motorists will in fact read and adhere to these as they apply to any given space or area. (“Failure to see” or “Failure to read” posted signs, whether on posts or on the pavement, is no longer considered a basis for an appeal of an issued citation).

## **207: EXCEPTION NOTIFICATION**

Individuals who require an exception to standard parking regulations must request an exception, either in writing or in person, PRIOR to the need for said exception. Students experiencing situations that involve long-term or repeated exceptions should contact Campus Security for a specialized permit. Exceptions that are class, project or work related must have their advisor, professor or supervisor contact Campus Security with the necessary information.

## **208: WARNINGS, TICKETS AND LOSS OF PRIVILEGE**

Parking enforcement officers are not required to notify or warn individuals regarding regulation violations. Warnings may be issued in relation to “Campus Parking & Traffic Regulations”. Regulations that are based on federal, state or local laws may have tickets issued without prior warning.

Individuals who receive either a written warning or an actual ticket will be notified automatically via email. The department of Campus Security attempts to notify individuals who may be at risk of either having fines doubled or loss of privilege, however there is no obligation to do so.

## 209: IMMOBILIZATION & TOWING

- Cedarville University will immobilize a vehicle based on the number of warnings/tickets issued to that vehicle (**refer to CUVR 603**).
- Cedarville University reserves the right to tow vehicles from its campus or controlled properties in accordance with the CUVR and ORC with administrative approval.
- Any vehicle that presents a threat or hazard, is in violation of the ORC or needs to be moved due to maintenance issues may be relocated or towed from the premises at the owner's expense.
- Cedarville University is not liable or responsible for any towing charges or any damage that may result from a vehicle being towed. All towing and impound charges (if applicable) or any claims for resultant damage incurred are the sole responsibility of the vehicle owner and must be resolved with the towing company and/or the owner's insurance company. (**refer to CUVR 603**).

## 210: SALE or REMOVAL of a VEHICLE

If a registered vehicle is sold, traded or if an individual removes a vehicle from the campus for the purpose of parking/storing it at their permanent residence, the university-issued permit should be removed and turned in to Campus Security.

Individuals should notify the office of Campus Security regarding any change in their vehicle's status within 48 hours or two business days.



## **CUVR 300: CAMPUS VIOLATIONS**

Section 300 – 310 (See also CUVR xxx, Fine Schedule #1)

### **300: CAMPUS VIOLATIONS**

Campus violations are those violations that are either specific or unique to Cedarville University campus. These include but are not limited to unregistered vehicles, Faculty/Staff parking, parking in a lot other than assigned, etc.

#### **301: NO CURRENT or VISIBLE PERMIT**

All vehicles must display a current valid parking permit, placed on the front windshield, in the lower corner on the driver's side. Vehicles bearing a temporary permit must display the permit hanging from the rear view mirror.

All permits must be visible, with nothing obstructing the registration number.

Vehicles that fail to display a permit, even if the owner has obtained a permit, may be cited for no current or visible permit.

#### **301A: BOOT APPENDIX**

Vehicles that have amassed multiple warning and/or tickets for being unregistered (no current or visible permit) will be immobilized until such time that the owner registers the vehicle and affixes the permit to the window as prescribed herein (**refer to CUVR 301 & 603**).

#### **302: ASSIGNED PARKING LOTS**

Vehicles are required to park in lots as assigned by their permit. Permits are issued based on the student's residency status. Cedarville is a "walking campus". Resident students are not permitted to drive on campus prior to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday.

- RESIDENT PERMITS (Blue) – these vehicles must be parked in a residential lot between the hours of curfew and 5:00 pm.
- APARTMENT RESIDENT PERMITS (Light Blue) – these vehicles must be parked in the apartment parking lots between the hours of curfew and 5:00 pm.
- COMMUTER PERMITS (Gold) – these vehicles are required to park in commuter (gold) lots.
- GRADUATE PERMITS (Silver) – these vehicles are permitted to park in both commuter and residential lots.
- FACULTY/STAFF PERMITS (White) – these vehicles may park in blue-lined spaces and white-lined spaces if all others are filled.
- MOTORCYCLE PERMITS – these permits follow the above listed requirements.

## 302: Parking in a Lot Other than Assigned, *continued*

- Vehicles that are left parked in commuter parking lots overnight must have prior authorization or they will be ticketed under CUVR 305.
- Resident-registered vehicles must be in a residential lot by curfew. Commuter-registered vehicles must be off campus by curfew.

### **303: TITLED PARKING**

Student-registered vehicles, whether resident or commuter, are not permitted to park in spaces as indicated:

- FACULTY/STAFF Parking. These spaces are blue-lined and are reserved for faculty & staff on a 24/7 basis.
- TITLED Spaces. These are spaces reserved by either name, title or function. These spaces are reserved on a 24/7 basis.
- VISITOR Parking. Visitor parking is indicated by either posted signs and/or pavement markings. These spaces are reserved between the hours of 7:00 am – 6:00 pm Monday-Friday.
  - Students and faculty-staff are not considered to be visitors.

### **304: TIME LIMITED SPACES**

There are only 2 time limited spaces on campus. These are located in the lot adjacent to the Chick-fil-A. These spaces are reserved for Chick-fil-A customers who are picking up orders. These spaces will be monitored for time and enforced even if Chick-fil-A is not open/operating.

### **305: OVERNIGHT PARKING**

Vehicles that are parked in any commuter or faculty/staff parking lot overnight without prior authorization from the Department of Campus Security will be considered parked illegally and ticketed accordingly. Members of any team (athletic, academic, music, etc.) must park in the van fleet lot.

### **306: ILLEGAL PARKING**

A vehicle is considered to be parked illegally if any of the following apply:

- Outside of a marked space or occupying multiple spaces (**refer to CUVR 204**)
- Parking in a hashed-off or yellow zone (not necessarily a fire lane).
- Parking in a loading zone in excess of 15 minutes.
- Parking in traffic lanes, extending parking rows, or sidewalks).
- Parking on lawns, sports fields or other landscaped areas not designated for parking.
- Motorcycles that are parked in violation of any part of CUVR 205.

## **307: TAMPERING**

Tampering consists of three parts: tampering with a permit, tampering with a ticket and tampering with a wheel-lock device.

### **307A: TAMPERING WITH A PERMIT**

Tampering with a permit is any incident where a person gives, sells or trades a permit with another person; or who attempts to fraudulently obtain, produce or reproduce a permit.

### **307B: TAMPERING WITH A TICKET**

Tampering with a ticket is any incident where a previously issued ticket is used in an attempt to avoid receiving a ticket for another offense.

### **307C: TAMPERING WITH A WHEEL-LOCK DEVICE**

Tampering with a wheel-lock device is any attempt to remove or disable a wheel-lock device (boot) once it has been applied.

## **308: DRIVING ON NON-ROADWAYS**

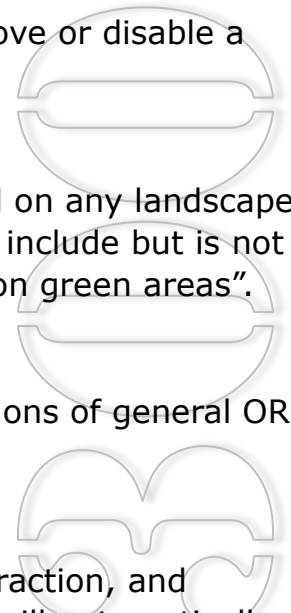
This is any incident in which a vehicle is operated or parked on any landscaped area not designated for vehicular traffic or parking. It may include but is not limited to sidewalks, walking paths, sports fields or "common green areas".

## **309: OTHER VIOLATIONS**

Citations may be issued for other violations, including violations of general ORC regulations.

## **310: CITATION ISSUANCE**

Most tickets are written and delivered at the time of the infraction, and effective August, 2024; individuals who are issued a ticket will automatically receive an email notification of the ticket. There may be occasions when the officer/department reserves the right to mail the citation to the registrant of the vehicle involved in the infraction.



## **CUVR 400: GENERAL VIOLATIONS**

Section 400-413 (See also CUVR 500)

### **ARTICLE 1**

#### **400: GENERAL PARKING REGULATIONS**

Sections 401-403 of Article 1 address parking regulations as established by federal, state or local ordinances. These include but may not be limited to handicap parking, fire lanes and fire hydrants.

#### **401: HANDICAP PARKING**

Pursuant to ORC 4503.44, ONLY those vehicle displaying a valid disabled persons license plate or placard issued by the resident state may use a disabled person's parking space. In cases where designated handicap parking is either unavailable or full, vehicles bearing a handicap placard may park in faculty/staff parking.

There is absolutely NO PARKING in the hashed-off areas adjacent to or associated with a handicap parking space.

Handicap spaces are designated by either signs or pavement markings. On private property, signage is NOT a requirement if pavement markings are present.

Vehicles parked in these designated spaces without the appropriate license or placard will be considered parked illegally and ticketed accordingly.

#### **401A: TEMPORARY HANDICAP PERMITS**

Campus Security will issue temporary handicap permits based on a physician's recommendation (**see also CUVR 200F**).

Vehicles that bear a state-issued license or placard have priority over temporary handicap permits.

#### **401B: RAMPS & ACCESS AREAS**

Hashed-off areas and access ramps associate with or adjacent to are to remain clear at all times. Vehicles parked in these areas will be considered in violation and cited accordingly.

#### **401C: FINES**

Cedarville University utilizes a graduated fine system for handicap violations. Vehicles in violation of this section will be cited with no further notice or warning. (**refer to CUVR 504 – Fine Schedule #2**)

**WARNING:** Handicap Parking spaces ARE NOT consider or are to be used as loading/unloading zones.

## 402: FIRE LANES

Fire lanes are designated by yellow curbs, yellow hashed-off areas, pavement markings and/or signs. These areas must remain clear of vehicles at all times. Vehicle should not park, whether attended or unattended in fire lanes. Traffic circles, which are by designation fire lanes, have a 15-minute load/unload limit. Loading or unloading must be evident.

## 403: FIRE HYDRANTS

Fire hydrants on campus are painted yellow but bear no markings or signs. In accordance with the ORC, a fire lane includes an area that extend 10 feet in either direction of a fire hydrant. Such areas may or may not be indicated by yellow has marks. Vehicles parked in these areas may be cited accordingly. Public law enforcement may enforce this regulation on the campus.

## 404: GENERAL PARKING ENFORCEMENT

Campus Security and Parking Enforcement Officers may issue "fineable tickets" for the listed offenses without having to issue a warning.

## 405: CITATION ISSUANCE

Most tickets are written and delivered at the time of the infraction, and effective August, 2025; individuals who are issued a ticket may receive an email notification of the ticket. There may be occasions when the officer/department reserves the right to mail the citation to the registrant of the vehicle involved in the infraction.

## ARTICLE 2

### 406: GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

Sections 407-411 or Article 2 address moving violations as established by federal, state or local ordinances. These may include but are not limited to failure to stop, unsafe operation and excessive speed.

### 407: FAILURE TO STOP

(**ORC 4511.07**) Stop signs are universally recognized and standardized as a red octagonal sign with the word STOP in white letters. In accordance with the Ohio Motor Vehicle Code, "...a driver MUST come to a complete and full stop behind the crosswalk or stop bar..."

**WARNING:** This violation may be cited in conjunction with excessive speed (408) and/or reckless operation (409)

## 408: EXCESSIVE SPEED

(**ORC 4511.211**) The posted speed limit on the university campus is **15 mph** unless otherwise posted. Recommended speed through parking lots is **10 mph**. No person shall operate a vehicle in excess of the posted speed limit. Vehicle operating in excess of the posted limit will be considered in violation and may be cited accordingly.

### 408A: EXCEPTION

Emergency vehicles, including but not limited to Campus Security, Cedarville University Medical Services (Medic 15), local law enforcement and fire departments are exempt from the posted speed limits, within reason while in the execution of their duties in any emergency.

**WARNING:** This violation may be cited in conjunction with failure to stop (407) and/or reckless operation (409)

## 409: RECKLESS OPERATION

In accordance with **ORC 4511.20** and **4511.201**, no driver shall operate his vehicle in a manner which disregards the safety of others, whether they are motorists or pedestrians, or the safety of property. The ORC defines reckless operation as "*...operating a vehicle...on any street...in a willful or wanton disregard for the safety of persons or property...*"

### 409A: DEFINITIONS

Reckless Operation may include but is not limited to:

- Displays of excessive speed, including but not limited to "power turns", "donuts", "peeling out" and/or the squealing of tires.
- The intentional weaving or "zig-zagging".
- The failure to operate or control the vehicle in a "normal operating manner".

**WARNING:** This violation may be cited in conjunction with failure to stop (407) and/or excessive speed (408)

## 410: FAILURE TO YIELD TO A PEDESTRIAN

(**ORC 4511.46**) All vehicles, including but not limited to automobiles, bicycles, scooters and skateboards (both motorized and non-motorized) are required to yield to pedestrians, when the pedestrian has the right of way. (**refer to CUVR 900**)

## **411: UNSAFE OPERATION**

Unsafe operation occurs whenever a vehicle is operated in a manner that MAY create a hazard or unsafe condition for passengers, other motorists or pedestrians. Unsafe Operation can include, but is not limited to:

- Driving left of center – no driver shall pass any other vehicle which is stopped for traffic, a traffic control device, pedestrians or when the driver’s view may be obstructed in such a manner as to create a hazard.
- Improper driving – any occasion when the operator of a vehicle knowingly and with consent allows:
  - Any person to ride on or in the moving vehicle in a manner that was not designed or intended for the use of passengers during transport.
  - Any person to be pushed, pulled or towed by the moving vehicle. This includes but is not limited to bicycles, skateboards, scooters, sleds or rollerblades.
- Exhibition of speed – this occurs whenever a vehicle becomes engaged in a speed contest with another vehicle(s), or when the vehicle engages in “drifting” or other race-related activities. In addition to being cited, violators of this section may face loss of privileges or restriction.
- Driving against the flow of traffic – No person shall operate a vehicle traveling in a direction opposite of the established flow of traffic. Traffic flow may be established by traffic signs, pavement markings or angled parking within a lot.

## **412: GENERAL TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT**

Campus Security and Parking Enforcement Officers may issue “fineable tickets” for the listed offenses without having to issue a warning.

## **413: CITATION ISSUANCE**

Most tickets are written and delivered at the time of the infraction, and effective August, 2025; individuals who are issued a ticket may receive an email notification of the ticket. There may be occasions when the officer/department reserves the right to mail the citation to the registrant of the vehicle involved in the infraction.

## CUVR 500: FEES & FINE SCHEDULES

Section 500 – 505

### 500: REGISTRATION FEES

Vehicle registration fees:

- Resident student \$100 per year\*
- Commuter student \$100 per year\*+
- Graduate student
  - Resident \$100 per year\*
  - Commuter No fee
- Dual Enrollment student \$ 25 per year
- Temporary Permit \$ 25 – valid for 21 days (**refer to CUVR 200**)

**\*Students who register their vehicle within the first two weeks of the fall semester receive a 50% discount on the registration fee.**

**+Commuters may register up to three vehicles for one fee.**

### 501: "FINEABLE TICKETS"

All fineable tickets, whether for parking or moving violations, are subject to processing within 10 business days from the date of issue. Fines are charged to the student account of the registered owner of the vehicle regardless of who was operating the vehicle at the time of the infraction.

All fines may be paid at the cashier's office, located in the lower level of the Stevens Student Center. Any appeals must be submitted within 10 days of the date of issue of the ticket (a QR code link to the appeals form is listed on each ticket). Resolution of appeals may take 14-21 days (**refer to CUVR 700**).

### 502: FINE SCHEDULES

There are two (2) fine schedules based on the category of the infraction.

- **Schedule 1** – Lists fines applicable to infractions covered under CUVR 300, including both parking & moving violations.
- **Schedule 2** – Lists fines applicable to infractions covered under CUVR 400, including both parking & moving violations.

Fine schedules DO NOT reflect, and may be in addition to other associated fees such as those imposed by Resident Life, Maintenance or Grounds.

\*In addition to any fines, violators are subject to cost of repair or replacement of the wheel lock device and are liable for any damage to the vehicle as a result of the attempted or actual removal of the wheel lock device, in addition to any possible discipline under the Cedarville University Student Handbook.

+The boot-removal fee of \$250 is in addition to the cost of registration and the cost of all previously issued tickets for being unregistered.

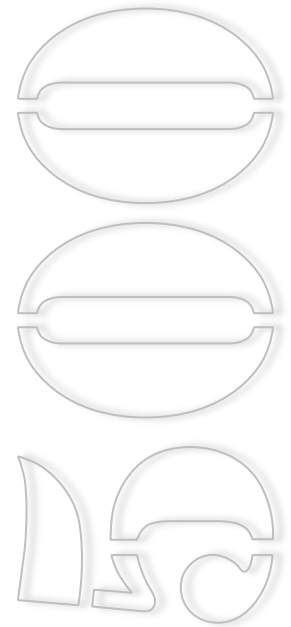
## 505: ADDITIONAL FINES

Habitual offenders are defined as any person who has been issued multiple tickets (CUVR 115). Multiple tickets are considered to be 4 tickets for the same offense or a total of 6 tickets whether or not for the same offense. (**refer to CUVR 602**).

Upon the receipt of the 6<sup>th</sup> ticket, fines will automatically be doubled.

Individuals deemed as a habitual offender will have the face value of any ticket issued doubled.

As noted in CUVR 503, vehicles which, as a result of multiple tickets for being unregistered will be booted. The boot removal fee is \$250 and is in addition to both the registration fee and any tickets previously issued.



## **CUVR 600: ADDITIONAL POLICIES**

### Section 600-603

#### **600: ACCUMULATION OF RECORDS**

All warnings, ticket and fines accumulate on an ANNUAL basis. They DO NOT "reset" at the semester break.

"Fineable tickets" which are issued and subsequently adjudicated as a warning by the appeals committee remain as an issued ticket and are included in the overall count.

#### **601: LOSS OF PRIVILEGE**

As stated in the preface of this document "...any use of any vehicle.. on any university property is a privilege granted by the university and is not the right of any employee, student or visitor.." As such, this privilege may be restricted or revoked for a period of time.

On a regular basis, for reasons of safety and security in addition to the possible need for maintenance or in regard to parking violations. Campus Security recommends and encourages checking your vehicle at least once in a 72-hour period.

#### **602: HABITUAL OFFENDERS**

- Students: a habitual offender is any person who has received four (4) ticket for the same offense, or a total of six (6) tickets regardless of the offense including any citations that may have been commuted to a warning during the academic year (August – May).
  - As noted in CUVR 505, the face value of any fine issued will double upon the receipt of a 6th.
- Faculty & Staff: a habitual offender is that person who has received multiple tickets regardless of the offense, indicating a lack of compliance with the regulations.
  - Upon receipt of the 3rd ticket, a written notice, either by mail or email, will be sent to both the offender and their supervisor.
  - Upon receipt of the 5th ticket, a written notice, either by mail or email, will be sent to the offender, their supervisor and the VP of their division.

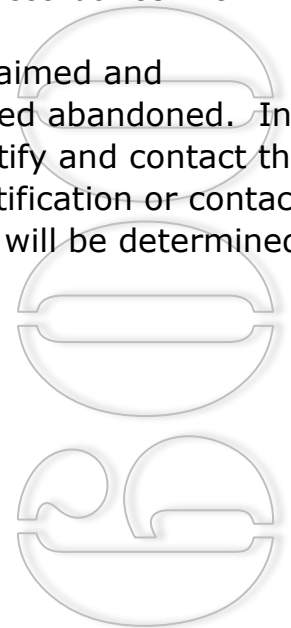
#### **603: IMMOBILIZATION & TOWING**

Vehicles may be immobilized (booted) upon receipt of multiple warnings and tickets for being unregistered. Immobilization results in a \$250 boot fee in addition to the registration fee and fines for any previously issued tickets (**refer to CUVR 505**).

## 603: Immobilization & Towing *continued*

Cedarville University reserves the right to tow vehicles that are on the campus or university properties based on extenuating circumstances and with administrative approval. Towing will be affect through the use of licensed and insured third party towing agent. Vehicles which may be towed may be done so at the owner's expense. Towing will be utilized in the following situations:

- Vehicle that, even after appropriate notification, remain parked in restricted area(s). These vehicles may be relocated to another lot on campus.
- Vehicles that may need to be relocated due to unforeseen circumstances, including but not limited to construction, parking lot maintenance; when the owner cannot be contacted or cannot move the vehicle. These vehicles will be relocated to another lot on campus.
- Any vehicle(s) that are left on the campus or university property and deemed "abandoned" may be towed and impounded in accordance with **OCR 4513.60**.
  - Any vehicle that is impounded and remains unclaimed and impounded in excess of 30 days will be considered abandoned. In accordance with ORC 4513.60, attempts to identify and contact the owner will be made. In cases where either identification or contact cannot be established, disposition of the vehicle will be determined by the impound operator.



## **CUVR 700: APPEALS**

Section 700-7037

### **700: TICKET APPEALS**

Any person who receives a ticket and believes that they were in fact in compliance with the regulations may appeal the citation. Appeals are submitted on-line via the registrant's T-2 customer portal or via QR code provided on the ticket.

All appeals must be completely filled out and submitted within 10 days from date of issue of the citation.

**Appeals dated later than 10 days from date of issue will NOT be considered.** Email or phone contact is not considered an appeal.

Verbal appeals, whether in person or over the phone will not be considered.

All appeals are considered by the appeals committee. The committee is composed of faculty, staff and students who are not directly involved with Campus Security. A minimum of 5 members is required for decisions.

### **701: DISPOSITION of APPEALS**

When appeals are submitted, they are forwarded to the committee on a weekly basis on Thursdays. Once the committee deliberates and reaches a decision, the decision will be published visible on the appellant's T-2 customer portal as well as an email notification of the decision.

Decisions are considered on a weekly basis, but under some circumstances may take 14-21 days.

All decisions of the Appeals Committee are considered final and binding. Once a decision has been published no further action will be entertained.

Disposition may have one of the following outcomes:

- The appeal is granted – the ticket is nullified, and the fine is eliminated.
- The appeal is commuted – the ticket is changed to a warning and the fine is waived. The ticket remains in the file and can be referred to.
- The appeal is denied – the ticket is upheld, and the fine is charged.

### **702: ACCEPTABLE APPEALS**

There are three (3) types of appeals that will be considered by the committee:

- Conflicting regulations
- Unclear markings, lines or signs (faded due to weather or use is not considered an affirmative defense).
- Emergency or unexpected medical situations that required the violation or made it unavoidable (proof may be requested/required).

### 703: UNACCEPTABLE APPEALS

Appeals that are considered unacceptable and will not be considered by the committee include but are not limited to:

- Ignorance or lack of knowledge of the regulations (*...this is the 1<sup>st</sup> time I've had a car...I didn't know...*)
- Inability to find a legal parking space (*...I drove around for ---minutes and couldn't find a place to park...*)
- Failure to see, read or follow posted signs.
- Schedule conflicts (*...I had an appointment and... or ...I was at work and didn't have time to drive to my dorm and still get to class...*)
- Cold, flu, other illnesses.
- Weather (*...it was cold and snowy and I was afraid I would get sick...*)
- Someone else was using my car
- Financial difficulty (*...I can't really afford a ticket right now...*)
- Other people were/have parked there and not gotten a ticket.
- I've parked there before
- Time issues (*...I was only parked there for 3 minutes... or ...I forgot I had parked there...*)
- I didn't receive a copy of the ticket

### 704: LOSS OF RIGHT TO APPEAL

Under certain circumstances, the individual's right to appeal may be forfeited. The decision to enact the loss of right to appeal is made by the appeals committee. Contributing factors may include but are not limited to status as a Habitual Offender (**refer to CUVR 602**) or an offense or circumstance of extreme severity.

### 705: LIMITATIONS OF APPEALS

Appeals are limited to the semester in which the original ticket was issued. The exception to this is any ticket issued within the last 7 days of a semester.

Fall semester appeals will not be re-opened after the second week of December. Spring semester appeals will not be re-opened after the second week of May.

Once a decision is published, that decision cannot be appealed. The decision of the appeals committee is considered final and binding (**refer to CUVR 701**).

### 706: PAYMENT OF FINES

All fines are charged to the registrant's student account. Fines will be charged on the 1<sup>st</sup> & 15<sup>th</sup> of each month.

Payments for all fines can be made at the cashier's office in the lower level of the Stevens Student Center.

## CUVR 800: SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS

### Section 800-802

#### 800: CAMPUS CONSIDERATIONS

Based on the fact that Cedarville is a “**walking campus**”, the following sections apply to all vehicle operating/parking on Cedarville University campus and/or controlled properties.

- Chapel or Presentations: Resident students are not to drive around campus prior to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday. Security recognizes that special events do arise. Permission to drive to and park at an event such as a chapel performance or a class presentation must be obtained **prior to** the need for the exception.
- Medical Issues: Individuals who need a temporary exception due to a medical situation or injury may obtain one at the Campus Security office. Applicants should provide a physician’s note (University Medical Services or the Athletic Training services are acceptable) (**refer to CUVR 200F**). These permits must be obtained prior to parking in exception to the rules. Medical exception permits (temporary handicap) permit the bearer to park in Faculty/staff parking **if** there are no other spaces available. Individuals who violate the provisions or abuse the privilege of this type of permit may forfeit their rights to the permit and it may be revoked immediately.
- Vehicle Maintenance: Generally vehicle repairs or maintenance work on automobiles on the campus is prohibited, without the **prior consent** from the Director of Campus Security or Director of Campus Safety. Such permission must be obtained **prior to** beginning work on any vehicle.
- Vehicle Appearance: All vehicles parking on university properties are to be kept in an orderly appearance and in working order. This includes but is not limited to excessive amounts of dirt, mud or debris, flat tires, or broken windows. Vehicles that are seriously damaged, appear to be disabled or abandoned will be marked and an attempt to contact the owner will be made. If the issue is not corrected within the 10 days after being marked, the vehicle may be towed/impounded at the owner’s expense.
- Disabled vehicles: in the event that a vehicle becomes disabled, whether due to accident or mechanical issues including “unknown causes”, the registrant **MUST** notify the Department of Campus Security. Notice **MUST** be provided within 24 hours of the vehicle becoming disabled. The registrant should plan for resolution of the situation.
- Snow Removal: In the event of snow that requires plowing, the following will apply:
  - Announcements requesting students to vacate selected lot(s) that need to be plowed will be made through appropriate means.
  - Physical plant or other authorized groups will plow the lot when empty.

## **801: SUMMER "STORAGE"**

Due to annual construction, paving, and maintenance and/or painting, faculty, staff and students are encouraged not to leave a vehicle on campus. If a vehicle must be left for the summer, the application must be completed showing a justified reason for the request, park the vehicle in the area designated by Campus Security and leave a spare set of keys along with the name and number of a contact in case of necessity.

**NOTE:** Cedarville University neither warrants or assumes any liability for the safety of any vehicle and/or its contents due to theft, loss of property, damage, vandalism, accidents or damage while left on university property (**refer to CUVR 201**)

## **802: UNATTENDED or ABANDONED VEHICLES**

Unattended vehicles are those vehicles which, at the completion of the academic year, are left unattended and/or unused for 120 hours or more (5 days).

Abandoned vehicles are those vehicles which, at the completion of the academic year, are parked, unused for extended periods of time (greater than 5 days) and are considered no longer in use.

Vehicles identified under the above listed definitions will be classified accordingly.

The Department of Campus Security, in accordance with ORC 4513.64, will attempt to identify and contact the last known owner and determine the disposition of the vehicle. Vehicles that are not removed within 10 days of notification will be towed from the campus or university property at the owner's expense per ORC 4513.64. Vehicles whose owners cannot be identified or contacted will be towed from the campus or property with no additional notice.

## CUVR 900: PEDESTRIAN & BICYCLE REGULATIONS

Section 900-906

### 900: PEDESTRIAN REGULATIONS

In accordance with ORC 4511.46, pedestrians **within a crosswalk**, or on the half of the roadway upon which a vehicle is operating; or if the pedestrian is approaching so closely from the other half of the roadway as to be a hazard, the pedestrian maintains the right of way (ORC 4511.132).

HOWEVER, it is to be noted that no pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or [sidewalk] and walk or run into the path of a vehicle so as to constitute a hazard.

In accordance with ORC 4511.48, pedestrians who are crossing a roadway at any point OTHER THAN a marked crosswalk or at an intersection with a marked crosswalk, **MUST** yield the right of way to all vehicles upon the roadway. No pedestrian shall cross a roadway intersection diagonally unless authorized to do so by official traffic control.

**This section DOES NOT relieve the operator of a vehicle from exercising due care to avoid colliding with any pedestrian upon a roadway.**

In accordance with ORC 4511.50, wherever a sidewalk is provided and its use is practical, it is unlawful for any pedestrian to walk along or upon a roadway. When a sidewalk is not provided, or a shoulder is not available, any pedestrian walking along and upon a roadway shall walk as near as is practical to the outside edge of the roadway and, if a two-way road, shall only walk on the left side of the roadway (**facing on-coming traffic**).

Pedestrians who are walking along or upon a roadway are required to yield the right of way to all vehicles upon the roadway.

Individuals found in violation of this section may be cited. Citations for such violations carry a fine UP TO \$20, depending on the severity of the offense.

### 901: BICYCLE & SKATEBOARD REGISTRATION

In accordance with Resident Life guidelines, all bicycles and skateboards are to be registered with the Department of Campus Security. Registration remains valid for the course of the individual's tenure at Cedarville University. Registration forms are available at the Campus Security office and registration is free of charge.

With the advent and increased use of skateboards and long boards on the campus, Campus Security strongly encourages and recommends that students register their skateboards.

## **902: BICYCLE PARKING & STORAGE**

Bicycles may NOT be parked inside any building, including building egress, hallways, stairwells, doorways; or in any handicap parking, handicap ramp or access area, against railings, signposts, light posts, etc., or in any place that would create a hazardous condition.

Bicycles are to be parked and secured in the bike racks provided or in close proximity to the bike rack if the rack is fully occupied.

Bicycles that are not properly parked or are left in areas not necessarily intended for bicycle parking, may be confiscated. Confiscated bicycles will be stored but are subject to storage fees.

Storage fees are \$5 per week with a maximum fee of \$50. Bicycles not claimed within 30 days will be considered abandoned and disposed of.

## **903: BICYCLES LEFT ON CAMPUS AFTER the ACADEMIC SESSION**

Students must remove their bicycles from the campus at the completion of the academic year (May). Due to multiple projects and hosting, bicycles are not to be left on the campus over the summer months. Bicycles left on campus after the end of the academic year will be considered abandoned and therefore confiscated, even in cases where a cable, lock or chain must be removed.

Students who remain on campus for the purposes of summer employment and who have a bike, should label the bike with their name and the term "Summer Worker" in order to avoid confiscation.

- Terms of Storage: Bicycles confiscated under this section will be held for 30 days. During this time, Campus Security will review all bike theft reports and will attempt to locate and contact the owners.
  - Bicycles whose owners have contacted Campus Security or are found to have been reported stolen will be stored for the summer.
  - Bikes that are stored for the summer may be subject to a storage fee.
  - Bikes that are stored for the summer must be reclaimed within the first 10 business days of the semester or they will be disposed of.
- Reimbursement: If it becomes necessary to remove a lock, chain or cable, Campus Security will not replace or reimburse the cost of said lock, chain or cable. Campus Security is not responsible for any loss or damage that may occur during the removal or storage process.

## **904: ORDERLY PRESENTATION**

In accordance with both the ORC and the CUVR, bicycles must be maintained in working order and have a good appearance. This includes all parts being intact and functional such as seats, pedals, brakes, etc.

## 905: SKATEBOARDS & SCOOTERS

Skateboards and scooters may be used on CU campus roadways and parking lots based on the respect of the rights and safety of others, both pedestrian and motorist. Operators of such are expected to:

- Operate in a safe and reasonable manner.
- Remain on the proper side of the roadway (flow with traffic).
- Follow posted traffic signs in accordance with the ORC.
- Avoid roadways and parking lots in the vicinity of and during university-sponsored events such as concerts, athletic activities or conferences of other events where a high volume of both vehicular and pedestrian traffic is likely.
- NOT operate inside of buildings or facilities.
- Utilize skateboard "storage posts" provided at/near the entrances of buildings.

## 906: GENERAL PROHIBITIONS

The use of bicycles, unicycles, scooters, skates, skateboard and hoverboards is strictly prohibited:

- Inside of ALL campus buildings & facilities.
- On entrance steps, ramps or accesses.
- On loading docks, ramps or steps.
- Along the edges of elevated curbs and/or sidewalks.
- On handrails, benches or other "furnishings".
